Dear Acting Chairman Thomas and Planning Board Members:

This office represents Medical Arts Sanitarium, Inc. d/b/a Cornerstone of Rhinebeck (hereinafter "Cornerstone"), a New York State licensed alcohol and drug rehabilitation treatment facility located on approximately 35 acres of land at 91 Serenity Hill Road, in the Town of Clinton. I am writing to update the application submitted to you on November 23, 2021 seeking, in relevant part, retroactive approval of an increase in the residential population of the facility from 66 residents to 99 residents pursuant to the requirements of §250-31(B)(5) of the Town of Clinton Zoning Code.

Cornerstone is fully licensed by the State of New York and has received: (i) a Chemical Dependence Operating Certificate from the New York State Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (now known. as the New York State Office of Addiction Services and Supports or "OASAS); (ii) an Opiate Treatment Program Certification from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services; (iii) a State of New York Department of Health Control Substance License; (iv) a New York State Department of Health Control Substance License; (iv) certification as an education and training provider by OASAS; (v) a limited service laboratory registration with the New York State Department of Health; and (vi) accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF), a highly regarded international organization for the oversight of behavioral health facilities.

The on-site sewer and water systems have been approved and certified by the Dutchess County Department of Health and DEC. The facility has been in continuous operation on this site for decades and was formerly operated as Rhinebeck Lodge for Successful Living (which was also a New York State licensed alcohol and drug rehabilitation facility) for many years prior to the sale of the sale to Cornerstone in June of 1998.

The former Town Zoning Administrator/Municipal Code Enforcement Officer, John J. Fenton (hereinafter "CEO"), by letter dated March 6, 2021, determined, after review of all relevant documentation and history of this facility, that Cornerstone is a "pre-existing, non-conforming use and structure and that the 50% expansion rule (as set forth in §250-84 of the Town Code) would apply to any proposed increase in the size of the facility". Mr. Fenton's letter was written in response to a request by Cornerstone for approval of the partial demolition and reconstruction of an existing pool building by issuance of a building permit by the CEO. Cornerstone's application for a building permit was denied by the CEO "without prejudice" to the resubmission of an application for special permit and site plan approval for the requested building expansion. Mr. Fenton also determined that the Cornerstone facility falls under the definition of "Alternate Care Facility" as set forth in §250-31 of the Town of Clinton Code which requires that any increase in resident population, change in type of population and expansions of the facilities require an application to the Town's Planning Board for consideration of a new special use permit and re-examination of the site plan by the Town's Planning Board. Mr. Fenton's determination was consistent with a similar determination made by Mary Ellen Cookingham, the then Zoning Enforcement Officer for the Town of Clinton, in a letter dated May 4, 1998, a copy of which is annexed hereto as Schedule "A".

The term "non-conforming use" is defined by §250-105 of the Town of Clinton Code as follows:

"Any use lawfully existing prior to the effective date of this chapter, which uses is not permitted or does not conform with the permitted use provisions of this Chapter for the district in which it is located."

Thereafter, Cornerstone withdrew its application for expansion of the facility. There is no application presently pending before the Planning Board or the CEO for new construction or expansion of any of Cornerstone's buildings or other infrastructure.

As an OASAS licensed alcohol and chemical dependence facility any increase in residential population requires approval from OASAS, as well as the Dutchess County Health Department. As documented in Cornerstone's submission letter dated November 23, 2021 (a copy of which is annexed hereto, without exhibits, as Schedule "B"), pursuant to approvals granted by OASAS, the residential capacity of Cornerstone increased from 66 to 71 on October 22, 2001; from 71 to 76 on May 6, 2002; from 76 to 84 on March 3, 2006; from 84 to 96 on August 2, 2006; and from 96 to its present capacity of 99 on October 7, 2016. In addition, each of these increases in residential population was approved by OASAS and the Dutchess County Department of Health.

It is acknowledged that Cornerstone did not, as required by §250-31(B)(5) of the Town Code, also obtain the approval of the Planning Board for such increases in population.

By letters dated February 17, 2021 and November 10, 2021, addressed to my office, Mr. Fenton notified me that Cornerstone's failure to obtain Planning Board approval for these increases in residential population constituted a violation of the Town Code. As a result, Mr. Fenton, in his November 10, 2021 letter, directed that action be taken to remedy this violation by "making the requisite application to the Planning Board as required by §250-31(B)(5) of the Town Code". In response to this directive, Cornerstone has made the requisite application to the Planning Board for retroactive approval of the increase in population. That is the application now pending before you.

In support of this application, Cornerstone has submitted to the Planning Board the following:

- 1. Letter of November 23, 2021, with several exhibits annexed thereto, including, but not limited to, (i) true copies of the Operating Certificates issued by OASAS for the increases in population of the facility; (ii) a Community Impact Statement required by §250-31(C) of the Code; and (iii) floor plans of the residential section of the facility, as well several photographs of the same.
- 2. Short Form Environmental Assessment Form.
- 3. A detailed Survey Map prepared by Steven J. Alex, L.L.S. on behalf of the Chazen Company Engineering and Land Surveyors, depicting all structures and improvements currently located on the Cornerstone property.
- 4. An Agricultural Data Statement.
- 5. A site plan and special permit application form.
- 6. Owners' Consent to application.

The Planning Board's records should reflect that Cornerstone appeared before you on December 7, 2021, at which time it was determined that the application should be referred to the Town's Engineer, Pete Setaro of CPL for review and comment. It was also determined that the Chazen Survey Map should be converted to a Site Plan Map in accordance with the requirements of the Town Code to be used as a baseline for future environmental and/or application reviews and review of Cornerstone's site plan and special permit application as required by §250-31(B)(5).

After review of Cornerstone's submissions, Pete Setaro issued a memorandum to the Planning Board, a copy of which is annexed hereto as Schedule "C". Cornerstone has complied with the requirements for a Site Plan Map, as set forth in Mr. Setaro's memorandum. Ten (10) copies of the Site Plan, prepared by the Cornerstone's engineer, Thomas Cummings, P.E., have been reviewed and approved by Mr. Setaro and filed with the Planning Board. As noted in Mr.

Setaro's memorandum, CPL conducted a visit of the property to compare the site survey with field conditions. The Daily Work Report prepared by Mark Long of CPL has been attached to Mr. Setaro's memorandum. The only discrepancy between the site survey and the site inspection was a buried propane tank in the grass island to the east of the residence hall. In addition, several members of the Planning Board conducted a site inspection of the property on January 12, 2022. The location of the propane tank has now been indicated on Mr. Cumming's site plan plat.

The Town's engineer has been provided with copies of Cornerstone's 2021 and 2022 permits to operate a public water supply issued to Cornerstone by the Dutchess County Department of Health. In addition, Mr. Setaro has been supplied with the current documentation from DEC verifying that DEC has a valid, up-to-date, SPDES permit for the facility and is in full compliance with the requirements of the same. In addition, Cornerstone has supplied Mr. Setaro with copies of the Water System Operation Reports for the water system duly filed with the Dutchess County Department of Health.

Mr. Setaro asked that the applicant's engineer confirm that the current water and sewage permits are in compliance with any increases in beds and patients at the facility over the years by reviewing the monthly water usage report submitted to the Dutchess County Department of Health and comparing the same with the New York State DEC SPDES Permit Sewage Discharge Flow. Mr. Cummings has performed that task by letter dated March 9, 2022, a copy of which is annexed hereto as Schedule "D". Mr. Setaro has reviewed Mr. Cummings report and determined that it satisfies the requirements set forth in his January 21, 2022 memorandum.

At this time, Cornerstone is supplementing its existing application materials with the following documents, copies of which are annexed hereto:

- 1. A Full Environmental Assessment Form, which has been submitted to, and reviewed by, the Town's Engineer, annexed hereto as Schedule "E";
- 2. Several letters of support for Cornerstone's facility from OASAS, former residents and various agencies are annexed hereto as Schedule "F", which will be introduced into the record at the public hearing.

Cornerstone requests that this matter be set down on the Planning Board's Agenda for the April 5, 2022 meeting for purposes of the Planning Board's review of the current status of the application with Cornerstone and its consultants, and Mr. Setaro, and declare that the application is complete for purposes of scheduling the public hearing. It is also requested that the application be scheduled for a public hearing before the Planning Board for April 19, 2022 and that the application and Full EIS be forwarded to the Dutchess County Department of Planning and Development in accordance with the referral requirements of General Municipal Law §239-m.

Finally, I would like to address certain spurious allegations which have been disseminated about Cornerstone's operation. It has been alleged, without proof, that Cornerstone has illegally expanded the type of population it serves since the date of its acquisition of the property and the facility. This is patently untrue. It is also patently untrue, as has been alleged, that the Rhinebeck Lodge had only been operated as a "sober retreat for patients and other families". At the time of Cornerstone's acquisition of the property from the Rhinebeck Lodge for Successful Living ("Rhinebeck Lodge"), the facility has been operating as a licensed drug rehabilitation and detoxification facility for many years prior. In 1997, the Rhinebeck Lodge was licensed for 8 detoxification and 58 rehabilitation beds. These licenses were transferred to Cornerstone by Rhinebeck Lodge upon its purchase. It should also be noted that Cornerstone has always operated the facility within the scope of its licenses. Drug and alcohol treatment facilities are legally prohibited from discriminating against any population, provided that the resident meets the program criteria.

Cornerstone is proud of the fact that it has received the highest accreditation ratings from CARF, a national accreditation body. However, CARF does not license program services as alleged by this individual. Licensing of the Cornerstone facility is approved by OASAS not CARF.

Contrary to these same specious conclusory allegations, criminal justice patients have always been a part of the population that Cornerstone and its predecessor, Rhinebeck Lodge, have served. Detoxification and rehabilitation services have always been available to the resident population at this facility. For example, Rhinebeck Lodge was licensed for 8 detoxification beds. Currently, Cornerstone is licensed for 6 detoxification beds. Annexed hereto as Schedule "G" are copies Certificates of Approval and Operating Certificates issued by OASAS to Rhinebeck Lodge to operate an in-patient substance abuse treatment and rehabilitation program and alcohol primary care programs dated December 1, 1997.

As is evidenced by the attached letters of support from former residents, local employees and agencies, Cornerstone provides critical aid and services to the community and the County for treatment of persons with drug and alcohol dependency issues. It is important to note, as demonstrated by the letter from OASAS annexed hereto as part of Exhibit "F", that all applications to OASAS for approval of increase in bed capacity require a demonstration that the services are needed. In this regard, the application requires the provider to demonstrate a need for the additional capacity beds being requested. In each instance where an increase in capacity has been granted by OASAS, Cornerstone has sufficiently documented local need for each capacity increase. As also noted by OASAS in its letter submitted in support hereof, since March of 2020, Dutchess County has witnessed an increase in demand for substance abuse disorder treatment and particularly the need for in-patient beds. According to Dutchess County 2020 Local Mental Hygiene Plan, unmet substance use disorder needs have significantly increased in recent years.

As will be demonstrated during the course of the public hearing, Cornerstone vigorously regulates the activities of its resident population and its residents are required to adhere to a strict set of rules and regulations concerning their conduct while in attendance at the facility.

Cornerstone is not aware of a single incident in which any resident at the facility has been arrested for, or charged with, a crime during his or her period of attendance at the facility. Except for the recent notification from the CEO regarding the need for approval of the increase in its resident population, Cornerstone, in its many years of operation, has not received a single Notice of Violation from the Town's code enforcement officials concerning its operation. Conclusory allegations that the increase in population of the facility from 66 beds to 99 beds has created a substantial burden on safety or quality of life of the surrounding community are, quite simply, meritless. Cornerstone has been well integrated in the community and has been a source of support of residents and local employees, as evidenced by the letters submitted hereto. Additionally, it should be noted that Cornerstone is one of the largest payers of property tax in the Clinton community, paying approximately \$75,300 per year in state, county and town and school taxes.



The facility was established on or about 1976 as a 34-bedrooms/68bed occupancy and continues to operate as such.

This office represents Medical Arts Sanitarium, Inc., d/b/a Cornerstone of Rhinebeck, an alcohol and drug rehabilitation treatment facility located on approximately 35 acres of land at 91 Serenity Hill Road, in the Town of Clinton. The facility has been in continuous operation on this site for decades and was formerly operated as the Rhinebeck Lodge for Successful Living (which was also a New York State Licensed alcohol and drug rehabilitation facility for many years prior thereto), until the sale of the same to Cornerstone in June of 1998.

Cornerstone is fully licensed by the State of New York and has received: (i) a Chemical Dependence Operating Certificate from the New York State Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services now known as the New York State Office of Addictions and Supports; (ii) an Opiate Treatment Program Certification from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services; (iii) Chemical Dependence Operating Certificate from the Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services of the State of New York; (iv) a New York State Department of Health Control Substance License; (v) Chemical Dependence Operating Certificate from the New York State Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services; (vi) certification as an education and training provider by the New York State Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services; (vii) a limited service laboratory registration with the New York State Department of Health and (viii) accreditation from Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF), a highly regarded international organization for the oversight of behavioral health facilities. The on-site sewer and water systems have been approved and certified by the New York State Department of Health.

The facility is licensed and regulated by the New York State Office of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse Services (OASAS) to provide support to individuals who have received, or are receiving, treatment for chemical dependency and to assist in their transition to the community. See, Mental Hygiene Law, §§19.07, 19.09, 19.40, 31.07 and 31.01.

During the decades of the facility's operation, it has become well integrated into the Town of Clinton and surrounding communities while adhering to all of the laws, rules and regulations of the Town of Clinton, County of Dutchess and State of New York. Annexed hereto as Schedule "A" is a letter dated September 6, 2016 from the Town of Clinton Building Department indicating that there were no known Code violations on this property as of that date. It is also our understanding that all required Certificates of Occupancy have been issued for the existing improvements on the property.

On November 19, 2019, I appeared before the Town of Clinton Planning Board with Don Petruncola, an architect from the architectural firm of Liscum McCormack Vanvoorhis LLP, to discuss the possibility of an application being submitted to the Planning Board for a proposal to demolish an existing one-story indoor pool addition to a three-story existing building on the property currently used as storage space. The proposal was to replace this structure with a two-story above grade and one-story partially below grade structure with no change to the footprint of the building. This addition would have increased the total capacity of the facility for inpatient treatment from 99 beds to 138 beds. However, this application was never approved, and there is no application pending before the Planning Board for any increase or additions to the existing structures or any increase in the patient capacity over and beyond the current 99 beds.

By letter dated March 6, 2020 sent to the then CEO for the Town, Louis Fiorese, I presented an argument supporting my client's position that the proposed expansion plans for the facility constituted a non-conforming use pursuant to the provisions of the Town of Clinton Code and that the proposed expansion was permitted under the 50% expansion rule set in §250-84(B) of the Town of Clinton Code.

In response to that letter, I received a document entitled "Denial Letter" from Mr. Fenton, Mr. Fiorese's successor, dated March 6, 2021 determining that, based upon the history of the facility, the facility is a "pre-existing, non-conforming use and structure". However, Mr. Fenton also determined that the facility falls under the definition of an "alternate care facility" as set forth in §250-31 of the Town of Clinton Code, which requires, in relevant part, that any increase in the resident population, change in type of population and/or any expansion of the facilities shall require application to the Planning Board for consideration of a new special use permit and reexamination of the site plan by the Planning Board. A copy of said letter is annexed hereto as Schedule "B".

As a result, Cornerstone's application for the issuance of the building permit for the expansion pursuant to §250-84(B) of the Code was denied with leave to make application to the Planning Board pursuant to the criteria set forth in §250-31 of the Town Code. This letter and the documents submitted herein constitute that application.

#### History of Cornerstone's Increase in Patient Bed Capacity

Pursuant to the provisions of Article 32 of the Mental Hygiene Law, it is the Office of Addiction Services and Support ("OASAS") that has the exclusive jurisdiction under New York State Law and Rules and Regulations to approve any increase in bed capacity for chemical dependency services such as Cornerstone. By these laws, and also pursuant to the provisions of 14 NYCRR Parts 800 and 814, Cornerstone was required to, and did, obtain approval from OASAS for all increases in bed capacity during the period 1998 to present. Additionally, Cornerstone sought, and was granted, approval by the Dutchess County Office of Mental Hygiene for each addition of beds to the licensed capacity. Annexed hereto as Schedule "C" are copies of the certificates issued by OASAS to Medical Arts Sanitarium, Inc. d/b/a Cornerstone of Rhinebeck which clearly reflect the fact that the required applications have been made to OASAS, for all increases in bed capacity, which have, in turn, been approved by OASAS for the current 99 bed capacity of the facility. It is Cornerstone's understanding that the Rhinebeck Lodge had also applied for, and received, the required approvals from OASAS for all increases in bed capacity to the 66 bed capacity, which existed at the time of Cornerstone's purchase of the facility.

It is Cornerstone's belief that the OASAS approval process for increase in bed capacity for alcohol and drug treatment rehabilitation facilities pre-empts the authority of the Town of Clinton to also regulate that bed capacity. Accordingly, this application is submitted to the Town of Clinton Planning Board with full reservation of rights.

Mr. Fenton's letter of March 6, 2021 was the first time anyone from the Town of Clinton confirmed in writing that Cornerstone was subject to the alternate care facility provisions of §250-31 of the Town Code.

Annexed hereto as Schedule "D" is Cornerstone's "Community Impact Statement" in accordance with the requirements of §250-31(C) of the Town of Clinton Code.

Submitted herewith are eight (8) copies of the current site plan for the facility and a copy of the Parcel Access for the property depicting all of the existing buildings and structures and outdoor facilities on the property.

#### **Proposed Screening**

Submitted herewith as Schedule "E" are plans for the facility depicting the current patient room and layout for the facility. Submitted herewith as Schedule "F" are various photographs of the facility depicting the rooms and the indoor facilities, as well as the outdoor recreation facilities.

Cornerstone is sensitive to the fact that there have been concerns from one or more neighboring property owners about noise coming from the facility during periods of outdoor recreation for the patients. Over the course of the last 23 years, Cornerstone has worked very hard to be sensitive to the fact that the facility has residential neighbors. The nominal number of concerns that have been expressed to us over the years have all been dealt with immediately. It is Cornerstone's

intent to further address noise and visual impact issues by construction of a vegetative buffer of ten foot tall green giant arborvitae along the 95 feet on the northern boundary of the property which Cornerstone has determined will help to mitigate any visual or noise impacts stemming from outdoor activities conducted on the property. Cornerstone is prepared to consider installation of other reasonable mitigation measures to address these concerns.

It is respectfully requested that this matter be set down before the Planning Board for an initial appearance and discussion of the application at the Planning Board's December 7, 2021 meeting.

Please let me know if you require any additional information or documentation with regard to this matter.

I am also enclosing a check made payable to the Town of Clinton in the amount of \$275.00 representing payment of the application fee.

After discussion at the January 18 Planning Board meeting, I indicated we would issue an updated review memo that supersedes our January 13 memo:

#### General.

- The purpose of the application was clarified that it is only to validate the current site plan that includes 99 beds, and no new construction is proposed at this time. The only new addition to the site may be additional landscaping that will act as a buffer to the neighbors.
- 2. In recent emails with the Town and the applicants, we have requested the applicant retain an engineer to confirm that the current water and sewage permits are in compliance with any increases in beds and or patients at the facility over the years. This could simply be documented by reviewing the monthly water usage reports submitted to the Dutchess County Department of Behavioral & Community Health (DCDBCH) and comparing with the permitted Hew York State Department of Environmental Conservation (NYSDEC) State Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (SPDES) sewage discharge flow.
- Our office conducted a site visit to review the site survey with field conditions and the Daily Work Report prepared by Mark Long, CPL, dated January 6, 2022, is attached hereto. Please show the propane tank indicated in Mark's report on the new Site Plan.

- 4. In summary the following comments are intended to require the applicant to prepare a Site Plan in accordance with the Code of the Town of Clinton, Chapter 250 Zoning, requirements, and standards for Site plans, in section 250-96 to be approved as a base site plan. Waivers of certain requirements listed can be requested if not applicable.
- 5. Since the Zoning Administrator's letter also notes a Special use permit is also required, the application form, project narrative and site plan should reflect the application is for Site Plan and Special Use Permit.

Based on our review of the submitted materials, we offer the following comments:

- 1. While a land title survey from 2018 was submitted, a site plan must be provided based on or referencing the submitted survey and providing key site plan elements to depict the recent site and interior changes made to increase the site's bed capacity from 66 to 99.
- 2. Provide a table including the following:
  - i. Square footage for the building footprints
  - ii. Gross floor area (GFA) including all floors in square feet
  - iii. Number of parking spaces and compliance with code
- 3. Add a zoning compliance table listing the zoning district lot area and bulk requirements and the corresponding actual values for the site's conditions corresponding to each of the zoning district lot area and bulk requirements, noting pre-existing, noncomplying conditions
- 4. Show wetlands and flood hazard areas along the site's lakeshore and frontage using GIS data, include approximate buffers where applicable by Town of State codes
- 5. Add signature blocks for Planning Board approval and owner's and applicant's consent note.
- 6. Provide a response letter with the next application submittal.

#### SEQR

- It was agreed at the meeting for the applicant to prepare a long EAF. We realize many of the questions may be answered N/A, however it will provide a baseline for future submissions. Include the NYSDEC resource mapper summary page that documents potential environmental concerns.
- 2. As stated at the meeting, we are not looking for the applicant to perform any environmental studies as part of this application, as no construction is proposed. However, this will establish the baseline for future environmental reviews if site plan amendments are proposed.



#### To Whom it May Concern:

I am writing this letter in relation to Medical Arts Sanitarium, Inc. d/b/a Cornerstone of Rhinebeck ("Cornerstone"). Cornerstone currently operates a total of four programs certified by the NYS Office of Addiction Services and Supports (OASAS), of which two are located at 500 Milan Hollow Road, in Rhinebeck – a Part 818 Inpatient Rehabilitation Service and a Part 816 Medically Supervised Inpatient Withdrawal & Stabilization Service, pursuant to Title 14 New York Codes, Rules and Regulations (NYCRR). At this time, the Part 818 Inpatient Rehabilitation Service has an approved capacity of 93 beds and the Part 816 Medically Supervised Inpatient Withdrawal & Stabilization Service has an approved capacity of 6 beds.

The Inpatient Rehabilitation Service, located on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Floor of Building 1 at 500 Milan Hollow Road, provides a safe and supportive setting for individuals who have stabilized in their withdrawal symptoms but where other factors indicate the need for longer-term 24-hour, 7-day a-week care. Cornerstone acquired the Inpatient Rehabilitation Service program in 1996

Since that time, Cornerstone has sought an increase in the program's certified capacity on multiple occasions. Program capacity increases are achieved via submission of an OASAS Chemical Dependence Certification Application. Part V of that application requires the provider to demonstrate a need for the additional capacity/beds being requested. In each instance, Cornerstone has sufficiently documented local need for such capacity increase and has obtained OASAS approval.

In fact, since March 2020, Dutchess County has witnessed an increased demand for substance use disorder (SUD) treatment, particularly the need for inpatient beds. According to Dutchess County's 2020 local mental hygiene plan, unmet SUD needs worsened as described below:

- Dutchess County experienced a record 93 fatal drug overdoses in 2017
- The overdoses show increased rates of Fentanyl in addition to heroin and prescription opioids.
- Data suggests an increase in opioid experimentation among the adolescent population.
- Community providers notice increased rates of cocaine abuse.

Dutchess County has identified a goal to address unmet need by reducing fatal overdoses in the county and reducing the rate of hospital emergency department admissions for heroin/opioid overdose.

Part II of the Certification Application requires providers to describe the space to be utilized for the additional capacity/beds. The proposed space is then reviewed and approved by OASAS' Facility Unit. The Certification Application also requires submission of a revised budget and staffing plan to meet the demand for the new capacity/ beds.

Prior to submitting any application, a provider must first complete a Prior Consultation with the local OASAS Regional Office and Local Government Unit (LGU). It is during this Consultation

that the provider is expected to describe the certification action desired and explain the justification for the action. The Certification Application cannot be submitted without the approval of the OASAS Regional Office and LGU (in this case, Dutchess County), who also must then provide final recommendation upon completing review of the submitted application.

Following the most recent capacity increase request, in 2016, Cornerstone is now certified for 93 patients at the Inpatient Rehabilitation Service program at 500 Milan Hollow Road, Rhinebeck.

Over the past 20 years, OASAS has consistently deemed this program to be "In Good Standing". During that time, OASAS has performed eight recertification reviews of the program, with it achieving a rating of "Substantial Compliance" in seven of those reviews.

Similarly, OASAS certifies Cornerstone's 6-bedded Medically Supervised Inpatient Withdrawal & Stabilization Service on the Ground Floor at 500 Milan Hollow Road. These services afford patients an array of detoxification services, while ensuring a comprehensive discharge planning mechanism that enhances the patient's ability to enter treatment after the completion of the withdrawal service. The goals of these services are: 1) to provide the patient with a safe and humane withdrawal from chemicals of abuse; 2) to reduce the medical and psychiatric morbidity and mortality sometimes associated with acute withdrawal; and 3) to encourage the patient to engage in ongoing treatment of his/her dependence.

Since initial certification, OASAS has performed six recertification reviews of this program, with it achieving a rating of "Substantial Compliance" in four of those reviews. In 2017 and 2019, the program was awarded a "Partial Compliance" rating – due to the program's fiscal viability scores. Those identified issues have since been rectified, to the satisfaction of OASAS.

After receiving OASAS approval to increase the capacity of this program 6 to 16 in 2006, the program then reduced its capacity back down to 6 in 2008. It has remained at that capacity for the past 13 years.

One of the largest problems facing our communities is substance addiction. According to the Pew Research Center in 2018, 68% of U.S. adults agreed that drug addiction was the biggest concern in the country today. We can only assume that this number has increased in recent years. In 2020, "nearly 92,000 people died in the United States from drug-involved overdoses." Data collected by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention from 2020-2021, estimate that "an average of 265 Americans died each day from a drug overdose.

These numbers are shocking, and serve not just as a call to action for the country, but for districts, towns, and communities as well. A call to action in the places where the impact of substance addiction can be directly felt. About 4 percent of Americans met the criteria for drug use disorder in the past year and about 10 percent have had drug use disorder at some time in their lives. 75 percent report not receiving any form of treatment.

When our bodies become sick we treat them. When we break a bone or catch the flu we go to a doctor, or a pharmacy, or our loved ones, to be healed. We ask them for help, care, and comfort as we recover. Sometimes, our families are the ones that force us to seek medical advice when we don't want to or see the need to. Healing is not an overnight process, and neither is overcoming addiction. We should not condend those working to heal, but instead provide the facilities and space necessary for them to recover. Cornerstone provides that space, that opportunity, not just for those seeking treatment to heal, but for families as well.

It has recently been brought to my attention that one of our longstanding and vital local addiction treatment resources is facing potential closure. I am writing to express my deep concern about this possibility, as it comes at a time when our community already faces a shortage of local inpatient addiction treatment options.

I have been a therapist in Dutchess County for fifteen years. During that time, my colleagues and I have seen a steady increase in addiction-related referrals and drug overdoses, especially since the onset of the pandemic. This steady increase necessitates the ongoing availability of local inpatient treatment options. These local inpatient treatment centers SAVE LIVES.

In my professional opinion, closing Cornerstone of Rhinebeck, an inpatient treatment center that has been serving our community for decades, would be a misguided and short-sighted decision. Making community decisions based on a "not in my neighborhood" stance is both irresponsible and unethical. Research strongly shows that community-embedded inpatient treatment centers are an important key to supporting addiction recovery.

In closing, I trust that the Board will carefully consider this decision, as a vote in support of closing Cornerstone of Rhinebeck would also be a vote to further marginalize some of our community's residents at their most vulnerable time and also to perpetuate an already worsening community crisis.

#### To Whom it May Concern:

I am writing this letter in relation to Medical Arts Sanitarium, Inc. d/b/a Cornerstone of Rhinebeck ("Cornerstone"). Cornerstone currently operates a total of four programs certified by the NYS Office of Addiction Services and Supports (OASAS), of which two are located at 500 Milan Hollow Road, in Rhinebeck – a Part 818 Inpatient Rehabilitation Service and a Part 816 Medically Supervised Inpatient Withdrawal & Stabilization Service, pursuant to Title 14 New York Codes, Rules and Regulations (NYCRR). At this time, the Part 818 Inpatient Rehabilitation Service has an approved capacity of 93 beds and the Part 816 Medically Supervised Inpatient Withdrawal & Stabilization Service has an approved capacity of 6 beds.

The Inpatient Rehabilitation Service, located on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Floor of Building 1 at 500 Milan Hollow Road, provides a safe and supportive setting for individuals who have stabilized in their withdrawal symptoms but where other factors indicate the need for longer-term 24-hour, 7-day a-week care. Cornerstone acquired the Inpatient Rehabilitation Service program in 1996.

Since that time, Cornerstone has sought an increase in the program's certified capacity on multiple occasions. Program capacity increases are achieved via submission of an OASAS Chemical Dependence Certification Application. Part V of that application requires the provider to demonstrate a need for the additional capacity/beds being requested. In each instance, Cornerstone has sufficiently documented local need for such capacity increase and has obtained OASAS approval.

In fact, since March 2020, Dutchess County has witnessed an increased demand for substance use disorder (SUD) treatment, particularly the need for inpatient beds. According to Dutchess County's 2020 local mental hygiene plan, unmet SUD needs worsened as described below:

- Dutchess County experienced a record 93 fatal drug overdoses in 2017.
- The overdoses show increased rates of Fentanyl in addition to heroin and prescription opioids.
- Data suggests an increase in opioid experimentation among the adolescent population.
- Community providers notice increased rates of cocaine abuse.

Dutchess County has identified a goal to address unmet need by reducing fatal overdoses in the county and reducing the rate of hospital emergency department admissions for heroin/opioid overdose.

Part II of the Certification Application requires providers to describe the space to be utilized for the additional capacity/beds. The proposed space is then reviewed and approved by OASAS' Facility Unit. The Certification Application also requires submission of a revised budget and staffing plan to meet the demand for the new capacity/ beds.

Prior to submitting any application, a provider must first complete a Prior Consultation with the local OASAS Regional Office and Local Government Unit (LGU). It is during this Consultation

that the provider is expected to describe the certification action desired and explain the justification for the action. The Certification Application cannot be submitted without the approval of the OASAS Regional Office and LGU (in this case, Dutchess County), who also must then provide final recommendation upon completing review of the submitted application.

Following the most recent capacity increase request, in 2016, Cornerstone is now certified for 93 patients at the Inpatient Rehabilitation Service program at 500 Milan Hollow Road, Rhinebeck.

Over the past 20 years, OASAS has consistently deemed this program to be "In Good Standing". During that time, OASAS has performed eight recertification reviews of the program, with it achieving a rating of "Substantial Compliance" in seven of those reviews.

Similarly, OASAS certifies Cornerstone's 6-bedded Medically Supervised Inpatient Withdrawal & Stabilization Service on the Ground Floor at 500 Milan Hollow Road. These services afford patients an array of detoxification services, while ensuring a comprehensive discharge planning mechanism that enhances the patient's ability to enter treatment after the completion of the withdrawal service. The goals of these services are: 1) to provide the patient with a safe and humane withdrawal from chemicals of abuse; 2) to reduce the medical and psychiatric morbidity and mortality sometimes associated with acute withdrawal; and 3) to encourage the patient to engage in ongoing treatment of his/her dependence.

Since initial certification, OASAS has performed six recertification reviews of this program, with it achieving a rating of "Substantial Compliance" in four of those reviews. In 2017 and 2019, the program was awarded a "Partial Compliance" rating – due to the program's fiscal viability scores. Those identified issues have since been rectified, to the satisfaction of OASAS.

After receiving OASAS approval to increase the capacity of this program 6 to 16 in 2006, the program then reduced its capacity back down to 6 in 2008. It has remained at that capacity for the past 13 years.

Will help me when I get out of here. They've help me realize my potential and how I deserve to live life on Lifes terms.

Thank You. Lisette Vasquez My name is Kalan Mayhue (25 years old) and I went to Cornerstone on November 16, 2021. I had been addicted to stimulants, meth and Adderall specifically, for 6 years. I had also been addicted to alcohol and marijuana for the same amount of time. When I arrived to Cornerstone of Rhinebeck, I was homeless, living in a car, with no food and hadn't taken a bath in weeks. I didn't know how to stay sober, because I didn't have to tools and wasn't educated on my disease. I had tried numerous times to "get clean" and to no avail. While at Cornerstone, I learned the skills I needed to stay sober. I had one very important group there that still follows me to this day, relapse prevention. The group was led by a gentleman named Vinny and he taught me that it was possible to stay sober. He brought to my attention all the reasons that I used, and he opened up many old wounds that I never realized had scarred me. He helped start the healing process. He helped me grieve over my addiction. I felt like getting sober I was losing a part of me, and he taught me it was okay to mourn the loss of the "old" me... because that me was never coming back.

It has been, to this day, one year, two months, and twelve days since I had last used a drug, drank alcohol, or had to live in a car or be hungry. I now work for a recovery community center, Second Chance Opportunities in Albany, NY as a receptionist. I have a home and a place to shower! I just purchased my first, new car! I have a savings account! I AM IN SCHOOL! I am going to school to be a paralegal! I've built back a relationship with my father, and many other family members. I have so much to be thankful for, and I couldn't have accomplished any of this without the help of the staff at Cornerstone who taught me the skills that I needed to stay sober and be a positive influence on society.

Something else I think is worth noting; my mother has now taken my lead and is now in treatment at Cornerstone. In AA and NA, the saying is "attraction rather than promotion." I didn't have to tell anyone how being sober helped me, they could just see it. My mother saw me doing good and followed suit and is now getting the help that she so desperately deserved. And when she came to me and said she wanted help, I couldn't think of any place I would rather have her go then the place that saved me life, Cornerstone of Rhinebeck.

To all the staff at Cornerstone, thank you for saving my life and helping educate me on my disease. I felt no judgement while staying there and I now live a life that I can be proud of. I can't wait to see how my mother's life changes and I can't wait to see all the people who come out of Cornerstone whose life has been changed, too!

I went to Cornerstone of Rhinebeck in 2019. The staff at Cornerstone saved my life, I was addicted to heroin for years and couldn't get clean. I want to thank staff Lori Costa for picking me up at the worst time of my life. If I didn't go to Cornerstone in Rhinebeck, I would definitely be on the streets, in jail or dead. The therapeutic meetings and staff were tremendously helpful. Cornerstone is one of the only places in the county that has a detox program that saved my life. May 12th, 2019 is my sober date and I haven't picked up since going to Cornerstone. I want to thank Cornerstone and the staff from the bottom of my heart because I now have the tools I need to not just survive. I now have a relationship with some family members that I haven't spoken to in 17 years. I have been able to hold down a full time job and have a girlfriend for the first time in my 47 years of life. I'm so grateful for this program, it has saved not only my life but many others. I have many friends I still speak to who also went to Cornerstone and are still sober due to the program at Cornerstone. Provisional data from CDC's National Center for Health Statistics indicate that there were an estimated 100,306 drug overdose deaths in the United States during 12-month period ending in April 2021, an increase of 28.5% from the 78,056 deaths during the same period the year before. In New York the rate has gone up by 15% in one year. In upstate New York the available treatment facilities dwindle.

Cornerstone has been a vital resource for people in the Capital District and the surrounding areas. We have sent hundreds of people to this program, all who have completed successfully, and returned to create a life in recovery. Where they are reconnecting with family, getting meaningful employment and becoming successful members of society.

Substance use disorder is a disease of the brain that wants people dead. In 1996 with the invention of the pain relief scale and oxycontin being introduced into the market, 100's of thousands of young people has been prescribed into addiction. All these years later there is still no education going out to the high school football team, soccer team or the local dentist.

We cannot do without Cornerstone, we cannot even think about limiting access to care. The staff at Cornerstone are responsive, empathetic and dedicated to the full range of substance use disorder treatment. We must have them in our community. This is no longer a war on drugs, we are trying to outpace the Coroner's office.

I can also completely understand from a neighbor's perspective how uncomfortable this would be living next to a treatment facility. Build a fence, build a nice big privacy fence, not white plastic but wood so it blends into the natural growth. Get the neighbor's input about decorating the outside of the fence so they don't have to stare at something ugly. Make it a mural, make it a hanging garden. Ladies and Gentlemen of the Board:

I am writing this letter to offer my support to Cornerstone both as an institution and as a treatment facility itself.

I am the therapist who runs the entire Individual and Relapse Prevention Outpatient Addiction Practice at Westchester Medical Center/MHRH in Poughkeepsie. I have often had occasion, over many years, to refer patients to Cornerstone in Rhinebeck when our own Inpatient facility has been either closed for renovations, COVID-19 or just plain full to capacity and could not take one more of even our own patients needing inpatient treatment.

In our profession, the best feedback on patient facilities comes by the experience patients have had while being treated at a Health or Rehabilitation Treatment Center. I have only heard positive and glowing reports of how patients were treated at Cornerstone and, the largest compliment they have made, by far, is the fact that not only is the clinical and medical treatment excellent, but the fact that they feel safe there. Safety is of their utmost concern as many have been to other facilities where they have not felt safe. They have stated numerous times; that they feel that the staff is structured. Patients cannot go out for walks unchaperoned. Patients are never permitted to loiter or congregate on or around the grounds, they tell me this in the context of explaining how very structured the program at Cornerstone is; and that they are there to get sober and healthy, not to be outside to smoke and or loiter, but to do their work and attend therapy and groups. This feedback is unlike many other facilities about which I have heard horrendous stories. This is why we refer to Cornerstone when our own facility is full as we know our patients will be safe and looked after which includes being inside and doing the work they need to do to get and remain healthy and to gain long-term sobriety.

I think that when people hear the word addiction or treatment center, they become frightened. Alcohol and Drug Addiction is a disease as or equally as common and lethal as Heart Disease or Cancer according to the American Medical Association and the American Psychological Association. People who fear these patients need to be reminded and educated that if Addiction goes untreated, just like Cancer and Heart Disease, people can die from it and it needs to be treated.

Cornerstone is one of the finest institutions in the Northeast to treat this illness. I hope that you will consider this when making any decisions that may reflect the future of this facility, as its presence has saved more lives than you or I could even begin to count; and with the Opioid Crisis upon us and the deaths being caused by it, we are in need of it remaining in place desperately.
